Killington wins league title in first season

The Summit Lodge Saints of Killington capped their first season in the league by beating the Jericho Indians, 10-4, in the league championship game on September 9.

The team compiled a 12-1 won-loss record, passing Lake Region for first place with a win in the final game of the regular season over the previously undefeated Rangers.

Only a 12-8 loss on May 20 to last year's champions, South Royalton, kept Killington from an undefeated league season.

Jericho's presence in the final game was made possible by their semifinal victory over Lake Region on September 2, by a 4-2 score, in an exciting battle. Killington barely qualified for the game, coming up with 3 runs in the bottom of the ninth inning to overcome Pour House by 7-6.

Proposal for an 18 and over league

Floyd Brown suggested that we determine the interest in forming a new league for players who are age 18 and over.

The younger league is an opportunity for players to continue to play hardball after high school or college, and provides a natural lead-in to our own league once the players reach age 35. Players can continue to play in the younger league if they want to.

The new league will play with full rules, and no pitching age limitations. It will be affiliated with the national Mens Adult Baseball League (MABL), so that the teams could participate in national tournaments and get other benefits.

So you think you know the rules?

This happened in a playoff game this year. With a 1-2 count a pitch came in high and inside, and the batter had to duck out of the way. In so doing he fell and injured his back, so that he could not complete the at bat. Every player on the team was already in the game, so there was no available pinch hitter. How do you think this should have been handled?

 ${\rm A}$ - the batter is out for not completing the at bat

 ${\rm B}$ - the at bat does not count, the player is out of the game, and the next batter comes up to the plate

C - without a batter in the box, the pitcher throws pitches until it is ball 4 or strike 3. If ball 4 then a courtesy runner (not a pinch runner) takes the base.

It was organized by a group called "Extra Innings", run by Jeff McKay, a former Middlebury player who was also baseball coach at UMass and California, who has organized this kind of event in other places. This was their first such venture in Vermont, and by the end of the weekend we were all planning to repeat it next year, probably as a 3-day event over the Columbus Day weekend.

One of those helping to run it was Karl Lindholm, a former player on the Champlain team, who works at Middlebury College. There were some participants who had not played baseball in quite a while, and some who just wanted to get some tips from a former major league player. But the most interesting was a group of 3 women who are members of a womens baseball league in New York.
